SHOW ENTRY FEES You may enter as many classes as you wish, at **20p per entry** (one entry per class) with a maximum payable of £2

ENTRY TO JUNIOR CLASSES IS FREE

POINTS will be awarded as follows:

1st - **5 points** | 2nd - **3 points** | 3rd - **1 point**

Class 1 "collection of 4 different vegetables" will be judged and scored using the RHS handbook / rhs.org.uk

EXHIBITION RULES

Junior classes are open to all under 14's.

All classes are open entry, i.e. you do not need to be a member of the Otford Allotment Association in order to take part.

Entry forms and fees should be in a sealed envelope and delivered (or posted) to the Parish Office, School House, High Street and marked "AUTUMN SHOW ENTRY".

All exhibitors must have grown or created exhibits themselves.

HINTS AND ADVICE FOR EXHIBITORS

Encourage your friends and neighbours to enter especially if you know they have a special craft or growing skill. Why not try one class completely out of your comfort zone for a bit of fun?

Read the schedule carefully! Six items will not be accepted if five is specified on the schedule. When staging (setting up) you are welcome to speak to the stewards for advice. You will receive one card per entry to be placed face down in front of your entry (the judge will turn cards back over after judging).

Quality is paramount – try to find examples that are young and blemish free, but still fully developed.

- Reduce foliage on carrots and beetroots to 3" (75mm)
- Onions and shallots should have the foliage cut off and then tied with raffia or string and not over peeled
- Exhibit peas and beans with stalks
- Courgettes and cucumbers with flowers if possible
- Clean all vegetables where possible
- Names and varieties where possible
- Evenness scores highly
- Do not polish apples, pears or stone fruit and show with stalks in place
- Take extra flowers and blooms in case of damage
- Take materials for arranging flowers in vases, i.e. moss, paper, oasis® etc.

THE GORDON DARBY MEMORIAL TROPHY

will be awarded for the most points accumulated from all categories in the show.

DAHLIAS

LOWRIE CUP awarded for the highest number of points in classes 44–48.

Vases and frames will be provided by the Association.

Maximum Sizes: Pompom: 55mm; Miniature: 115mm; Small: 170mm; Medium: 220mm; Large: 280mm; Giant: no limit.

- **44** 3 small or miniature cactus and/or semi-cactus 1 or more cultivar/variety
- **45** 3 small or miniature decorative 1 or more cultivar/variety
- **46** 3 pompom 1 or more cultivar/variety
- 47 1 large or giant bloom
