The Otford Allotment Association was formed in 1953 when 42 keen allotment holders got together to form the association. Over the last 69 years we have concentrated on matters affecting the allotments and encouraging the growing of vegetables, and, where possible, fruit, for the table throughout the year. We now have over 80 members and over 50 associate members working 107 plots of sizes varying from 2.5 rods to 10 rods.

The show has been organised by members of the Association on behalf of the village, not just allotment holders. In the past members of the Association have taken away some of the top prizes after entering vegetables grown on their allotments. Perhaps there are some other villagers who can surpass them.

We have classes for everyone in the show competition, including the children's marigold competition. We look forward to seeing all the entries.

SHOW ENTRY FEES You may enter as many classes as you wish, at **20p per entry** (one entry per class) with a maximum payable of £2

ENTRY TO JUNIOR CLASSES IS FREE

NOVICE CLASSES Any exhibitor who has not won any first prize in that show category.

POINTS Where points are awarded, there are three points for first place, 2 for second place and one for third place. Class 1 "collection of 3 different vegetables" will be judged and pointed using the RHS handbook (also online at RHS).

PRIZES All novice classes win £5 for a first prize. No other cash prizes will be given.

EXHIBITION RULES

All classes are open entry (ie, you do not need to be a member of the Otford Allotment Association).

Junior classes are open to all under 16's who live in Otford or belong to any organisation in Otford.

Entry forms and fees should be in a sealed envelope and delivered (or posted) to the Parish Office on the high street and marked "AUTUMN SHOW ENTRY".

All exhibitors must have grown exhibits on their allotment or at their residence.

HINTS AND ADVICE FOR EXHIBITORS

Encourage your friends and neighbours to enter especially if you know they have a special craft or growing skill. Why not try one class completely out of your comfort zone for a bit of fun?

Read the schedule carefully! Six items will not be accepted if five is specified on the schedule. When staging you are welcome to speak to the stewards for advice. You will be given one card per entry and these are to be turned down for the judging (the judge will turn them back over after judging).

Quality is paramount. Try to find examples that are young, blemish free but still fully developed.

- Reduce foliage on carrots, beetroot and parsnips to 3" (75mm)
- Onions and shallots should have the foliage cut off and then tied with raffia or string and not over peeled
- Exhibit peas and beans with stalks
- Courgettes and cucumbers with flowers if possible
- Clean all vegetables where possible
- Names and varieties where possible
- Evenness scores highly
- Do not polish apples, pears or stone fruit and show with stalks in place
- Take extra flowers and blooms in case of damage
- Take materials for arranging flowers in vases, i.e. moss, paper, oasis® etc.

- 3 pears 1 cultivar/variety

- 5 stoned fruit, with stalks 1 *cultivar/variety*
- 12 berried fruits must have stalks
- any other fruit in season *maximum of 5*
- NOVICE CLASS any fruit from classes 37–42.

DAHLIAS

LOWRIE CUP awarded for the highest number of points in classes 44–48.

Maximum Sizes: Pompom 55mm; Miniature 115mm; Small 170mm; Medium 220mm; Large 280mm; Giant No Limit.

- 3 small or miniature cactus and/or semi-cactus 1 or more cultivar/variety
- 3 small or miniature decorative 1 or more cultivar/variety
- 3 pompom 1 or more cultivar/variety
- 47 1 large or giant bloom

- 3 blooms any cultivar/variety not included above, e.g. single or collerette
- A vase of mixed dahlias up to 8
- A vase of dahlias for effect *this is not a flower arrangement*
- A dahlia in a frame a single bloom to be displayed in a frame supplied by the society
- NOVICE CLASS 3 dahlias from members who have not won any 1st prizes for dahlias in the last five years.

- 5 stems herbaceous perennials *1 cultivar/variety*
- 1 bloom 'large flowered' HT rose.

- 57 A vase of mixed flowers for effect
- 1 spray flowering or berried shrub or tree no more than 60cm extending over top of vase
- 3 blooms of chrysanthemum
- 5 blooms french marigolds own container optional
- 61 3 stems pelargoniums

- 6 specimen fuchsia blooms to be staged in test tubes in a show box, upplied by the Association
- 63 1 stem fuchsia
- 64 5 stems annuals
- Pot plant in flower, not orchid *up to 5"/12.5cm pot*
- Pot plant in flower, not orchids over 5"/12.5cm pot
- Pot plant for foliage *up to 5"/12.5cm pot*
- Pot plant for foliage over 5"/12.5cm pot
- Orchid in flower any size pot
- **70** Planted patio pot or container pot not exceeding 40cm in either height or width, planted with at least three different types of plant. To be judged by public vote
- NOVICE CLASS any flower from classes 53–64.
